

Christian Education • Sunday October 29 is Reformation Sunday

The Protestant Reformation holds a significant place in Christian history, and reflecting on its impact reveals how pivotal it was for shaping modern faith and practice. Personally, the Reformation resonates as a movement that redefined the nature of faith, church authority, and the individual believer's relationship with God. Spearheaded by Martin Luther and other reformers, it called for a return to the foundations of scripture and

emphasized salvation by grace through faith alone—a radical departure from the prevailing Catholic doctrines of the time.

One striking aspect of the Reformation was its challenge to the institutional power of the Church. Luther's 95 Theses, for example, attacked the sale of indulgences and raised questions about the role of clergy as mediators between God and humanity. Reflecting on this, I'm reminded of how this shift empowered the people to engage directly with scripture and nurtured the idea of a "priesthood of all believers." The Bible was translated into vernacular languages, breaking down the barriers that kept ordinary people from accessing God's word. This personal access to scripture, still so vital today, opened up an era of individual faith exploration that resonates deeply with me.



Moreover, the Reformation was not without its challenges. It led to divisions, doctrinal disputes, and even violent conflicts. While it birthed Protestantism, it also fragmented the Church into various denominations. Reflecting on this, I see both the strength and fragility of the Christian community. The courage to stand up for truth can sometimes result in separation, but it also reminds me of the ongoing need for dialogue, unity, and humility within the Church.

Ultimately, the Reformation has left a lasting legacy in how we approach faith today — emphasizing the authority of scripture, the centrality of grace, and the importance of personal conviction. For me, it serves as a reminder to never take the gift of faith and scripture for granted, to always seek deeper understanding, and to remain steadfast in the pursuit of truth, just as the reformers did centuries ago.

God made Everything. God made you, too!

Each week in "The Story" Students learn about the Upper Story (God's Story) with the rest of the church but



students also explore a Lower Story where we Messiah Lutheran focus in on a specific part of the week's chapter and dive into how it affects their lives.

For example the first week we talked about Genesis, but also discussed what it means to have "dominion" over the earth. Students imagined what the **Messiah Lutheran** world would look like if we took care of it and each other the way we are called to. 5th and 6th arade



A Note from your Council President

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

October has arrived. Fall Activities are in full swing for worship, youth, Bible studies, Sunday School and fellowship. Along with the activities, the need for volunteers continues. I would encourage everyone to find a place where your time, talents and gifts can best be used to serve and glorify Our Lord.

As Pastor Laurie guides Messiah Lutheran through God's Word in THE STORY, we are knit together as a congregation rich in history, vision, purpose and mission.

Messiah Lutheran has, from our inception, been blessed with visionary members and pastors. We follow in the footsteps of Martin Luther who over 500 years ago began the first steps of The Reformation on October 31, 1517 when he posted the 95 Theses on the doors of Wittenberg. Martin Luther was excommunicated from the Catholic church and lived in exile at Wartburg Castle where he translated the New Testament in German in eleven weeks. One year later, Luther's German translation of the New Testament was published: making it possible to read the Bible for yourself. Martin Luther also gave us The Small Catechism that many of us memorized from cover to cover. We learned the Ten Commandments, The Apostles' Creed, & The Lord's Prayer—and how they help us simply communicate the faith we share from generation to generation. In the words of Eric Metaxas:

"Luther's first hand courage gave birth to the ideas of liberty, equality, and individualism that totally lie at the heart of all modern life." (*Martin Luther: The Man who Rediscovered God and Changed the World by Eric Metaxas*)

As we read through THE STORY together, I am looking forward to watching our congregation experience The Word, while creating a closer relationship with God. This is most certainly true.

Some quotes from Martin Luther:

"To be Christian without prayer is no more possible than to be alive without breathing."

"You are not responsible for what you say, but also for what you do not say."



"God writes the gospel not in the Bible alone, but also on trees, and in the flowers, and clouds and stars."

"Our Lord has written the promise of resurrection, not in books alone, but in every leaf of springtime."

The 2024 Messiah Bag Sale

The 2024 \$5 Bag Sale was another success story!!! What was started 39 years ago by Messiah WELCA women continues to flourish and seems to be an anticipated event for our community as well. We were blessed to receive \$1974.66 for our worthy recipients: Prevent Child Abuse—ND and Patriot Assistant Dogs for Veterans. Both agencies will receive their monies at the December 2024 Christmas brunch.

Over the 4 days from set-up to take-down, we were blessed to have 41 volunteers donate over 270 hours for this event. That is

11+ days of work in our short time frame!! Amazing!! We had new signage for indoors/outdoors, and on the clothing racks, which received lots of positive comments and made "shopping" easier.

We also donated items to 11 charitable destinations, including: office supplies for our own Messiah Church; vases for Hornbachers; shoes for the Good Feet Store (for their SOLE to SOUL program); worn towels for

Homeward Animal Shelter; items for Open Door 65; purses and personal hygiene items for the YWCA Shelter; medical equipment for HERO; and furniture for Furniture Mission. All the books were taken to a Used Book Store so we now have \$42 credit for our church to be used as seen fit. At the very end of the event, several pieces of cold weather clothing are ready

for Messiah's Winter Clothing Drive that will be held in January 2025. The rest of the items were boxed up and picked up by Dakota Boys & Girls Ranch Thrift the following Monday.

Thank you a thousand times over for all the fantastic volunteers who worked hard and so well together!!! Thank you Lord Jesus for wonderful weather and a favorable outcome. Please know we appreciate each and every one of you for your donations, support, volunteerism and prayers. It "DOES take a village," and "many hands make light work."




Noisy Change Offering: Sunday, October 13



Messiah's 25th Anniversary in 1975

Our 25th Anniversary in April 1975 was marked with special events including festive worship services and an afternoon program filled with music and memories. The theme was "Rejoice in Faith, Love, and Hope". Dr. Anton Nelson, who led the Board of American Missions at Messiah's founding, delivered the sermon. Celebrants included Rev. Hugo Anderson, who had served as the mission intern before the congregation's establishment, as well as former pastors Vernon Johnson, Drell Bernhardson, and Lorance Schoenberg.

Our 50th Anniversary in October 2000 coincided with a major building remodel and addition project with the theme, "On Our Way Rejoicing". The celebration featured worship services and an anniversary luncheon, drawing together the Messiah community. Former pastors Drell Bernhardson, Leslie Wassberg, Harry Olson, and Lorance Schoenberg—who traveled nearly 1,500 miles from Washington state—joined the festivities. Pastors Glenn Schoonover, Matt Valan, and Paul Campbell also contributed messages in the weeks following the celebration.

As we look ahead to our 75th Year of Ministry in 2025, stay tuned for details about this significant milestone in our faith community!


Why wear red on Reformation Sunday?

<u>Martyrs</u> \diamond Red is a tribute to those who have been martyred for their faith in Jesus.

<u>Strength</u> \diamond Red symbolizes the strength and power that the Holy Spirit gives to God's people.


